10 WAYS TO TEACH A BIBLE VERSE

1. VISUALIZED BIBLE VERSE

 Prepare a display card, poster, or power point projection of the Bible verse with visualizations. Read through the Bible verse several times with the children. Explain the context and meaning of the visualizations.

2. REMOVE A WORD

 Write each word of the verse on a whiteboard. Read through the Bible verse several times with the children. Invite a child to come and erase a word from the verse. Read through the Bible verse again with all the children. Repeat the process until there are no words left, and the children are reciting the verse by memory.

3. GUESS THE WORD

Write out each word of the verse on a whiteboard. Then erase several
words and draw pictures instead. For example, "I will make you fishers of
men" could be written (picture of an eye) will make (letter U) (picture of
man fishing) of (stick figures). Have the children guess the correct
meaning of the pictures. Read through the verse several times with the
children.

4. DRAMATIC GESTURES

Think of large, active gestures for words in the verse. You will also need
a written or visualized copy of the verse to display. Lead the children in
reciting the verse, teaching them the gestures. Make it as dramatic and
exciting as possible.

5. ECHO

Say the verse in small portions, having the children repeat each portion
after you. For example "I will make you" (I will make you), "fishers of
men" (fishers of men). Do this several times. Then use different voices or
accents, having the children repeat after you. For example: whisper, shout,
squeaky, deep, British accent, Southern accent, etc.

 Write each word of the verse on sticky notes and arrange them in order on a whiteboard. Read through the Bible verse several times with the children. Invite a child to come and take down a sticky note. Read through the Bible verse again with all the children. Repeat the process until there are no sticky notes left, and the children are reciting the verse by memory.

7. BALLOON POP

 Write each word of the verse on blown-up balloons and tape them in order on a whiteboard. Read through the Bible verse several times with the children. Pop a balloon word. Read through the Bible verse again with all the children. Repeat the process until there are no balloons left, and the children are reciting the verse by memory.

8. SING ALONG

• Set the words of the verse to a popular tune. You will also need a written or visualized copy of the verse to display. Lead the children in singing the verse, by having them sing each line after you. For example, Genesis I:I can be set to the tune "Frere Jacques" (Are You Sleeping, Brother John). "In the beginning" (In the beginning) "God created" (God created) "The heaven and the earth" (The heaven and the earth) "Genesis I:I" (Genesis I:I).

9. HANGMAN

Draw a hangman stand on a whiteboard. Write out spaces for each
word of the verse. (The children will be guessing words instead of
letters.) Let the children take turns guessing a word of the verse. If they
guess a word that is in the verse, write it in the correct space. If they
guess a word that is not in the verse, draw a part of the hangman.

10. BIBLE CHALLENGE

 Make several paper cutouts of each word of the verse and provide pieces of colorful construction paper. There should be enough for each child to have one piece of construction paper and a cutout of each word of the verse. The children should then compete to glue the words of the verse in the correct order on the construction paper.
